This access point is not needed when an alternate access point (actually two) already exists as part of the Phase 3 (& 4) final plat connecting Comal Creek Trail (street) with the existing crushed granite trail. My understanding has been this was the intended purpose of the 30'+ strip of land (Lot 904 Parkland, Final Plat Establishing Town Creek Subdivision Phase 3) on the part of the developer. It was <i>only yesterday</i> , when the City Engineer was pressed about why there was a proposed access point at Springs Nursery, located at a very traffic-congested location, that I received the answer that "it was dictated by terms of the AAMPO grant funding". <i>If this is indeed the case, we are requesting that you provide the actual language in the grant showing why 3 PUBLIC access points are required on a .91 mile trail segment.</i>	AAMPO grant funding requires the project be open to the general public. Neighborhood connections are part of trail systems and import for safe and convenient public access.

				Town Creek, at the conclusion of our final phase, is projected to have over 500 residents. Traffic, parking and safety are legitimate concerns. How Segment #1 of the Dry Comal Creek Greenway is designed, built and managed after completion directly impacts our property values.	We don't anticipate parking issues for the first segment due to the limited length and destination. The Town Creek neighborhood will be the primary users of the trail. Note that two miles of County Line Memorial Trail has nine public parking spaces.
